Paul's love for his new Christian communities

Paul's letters to his new communities are among the earliest writings of the early Christians; some of them dated many years before the Gospels were written.

In today's letter to the Thessalonians we hear the first five verses of Chapter one which is his introduction and welcome. After his introduction, blessing and welcome he is particularly complementary about the community and how thoroughly they embraced his message of the Kingdom of God, '... when we brought the Good News to you, it came to you not only as words, but as power and as the Holy Spirit and as utter conviction.' In his second letter to the Thessalonians he is similarly enthusiastic about them, 'Among all the churches of God we take special pride in you.' They seem to be one of the most effective communities he established, and possibly one that gave him least worry.

Paul travelled through the countries of the eastern Mediterranean between Jerusalem in the South- East and Rome in the North-West. He suffered several arrests, shipwreck, floggings and attempts on his life, all in order to spread the Kingdom of God beyond Israel. He would visit a town or city and start with the local Jewish community telling them about Jesus as their Messiah and that the Kingdom of God is for all people's, not just the Jews. He would extend his message to anyone who would listen. He would stay with those who embraced his message, sometimes for months or years. Hopefully leaving a new Christian community which could follow his example and be able to continue to grow without him.

He developed a great affection for these burgeoning communities and would write to them with encouragements, teaching, correction (where necessary) and giving judgement on questions or issues. The more places he visited the more communities he had to maintain. Some he would visit a second time on a future journey. But he cared for them all and worried about them. The temptations for these new communities were many: they might revert to their previous pagan gods and sinful way of life, the Jewish people could lose faith in Jesus as the Messiah and return to their Jewish life, they could lose faith because of fear of the Romans and the frequent persecution of Christians.

The fact that these communities survived, and indeed thrived, to the extent where they became the foundations upon which all Christians today are built, is an amazing miracle. By 313 AD the Emperor Constantine issued the Edict of Milan which accepted Christianity as an acceptable religion of the Roman Empire. Prior to this Christianity was an illicit, persecuted sect. After the edict Christianity became a welcomed, and eventually, the dominant religion of the Roman empire.

This miracle of the growth of Christianity was shaped by the love and care of Paul for those early communities. He, of course, would give all of the credit to the Holy Spirit working through him.

First Reading: Cyrus, King of Persia, Chosen by God Isaiah 45:1. 4-6

Thus says the Lord to his anointed, to Cyrus, whom he has taken by his right hand to subdue nations before him and strip the loins of kings, to force gateways before him that their gates be closed no more. 'It is for the sake of my servant Jacob, of Israel my chosen one, that I have called you by your name, conferring a title though you do not know me. I am the Lord, unrivalled; there is no other God besides me. Though you do not know me, I arm you that men may know from the rising to the setting of the sun that, apart from me, all is nothing.'

The Response to the Psalm: Give the Lord glory and power.

Second Reading: Paul Greets the Church in Thessalonika 1 Thessalonians 1:1-5

From Paul, Silvanus and Timothy to the Church in Thessalonika which is in God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ; wishing you grace and peace from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. We always mention you in our prayers and thank God for you all, and constantly remember before God our Father how you have shown your faith in action, worked for love and persevered through hope, in our Lord

Jesus Christ. We know, brothers, that God loves you and that you have been chosen, because when we brought the Good News to you, it came to you not only as words, but as power and as the Holy Spirit and as utter conviction.

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! Your word is truth, O Lord: consecrate us in the truth. Alleluia!

The Gospel: Giving God His Due Matthew 22:15-21

The Pharisees went away to work out between them how to trap Jesus in what he said. And they sent their disciples to him, together with the Herodians, to say, 'Master, we know that you are an honest man and teach the way of God in an honest way, and that you are not afraid of anyone, because a man's rank means nothing to you. Tell us your opinion, then. Is it permissible to pay taxes to Caesar or not?' But Jesus was aware of their malice and replied, 'You hypocrites! Why do you set this trap for me? Let me see the money you pay the tax with.' They handed him a denarius, and he said, 'Whose head is this? Whose name?' 'Caesar's,' they replied. He then said to them, 'Very well, give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar - and to God what belongs to God.'

Giving God His Due

They must really have thought they had their victim sewn up! If Jesus said he paid the Roman taxes, he recognised the Emperor. not God, as his Lord. If he said he didn't pay, he was a traitor to Rome. Jesus turns the question back on them. First he makes them admit that they themselves recognise Rome as overlord by carrying a Roman coin, for the coin would carry the Emperor's head. Next he puts them a question: what do they consider is due to Caesar? Finally he goes beyond their guestion, to interrogate their ultimate loyalty: in the last analysis, just what is due to God? At a superficial level this seems a little verbal tussle, in which Jesus outwits his opponents. But the story was remembered and passed on in the Christian community not because of Jesus' cleverness. but because at a deeper level it is a question which Jesus puts to each of us: just where do our loyalties and priorities lie? Money? Respect? Sex? Fame? A good holiday? Comfort? Power? Jesus is not a dictator who imposes his will. He just asks the guestion and leaves us to give our own answer. To those who question him he gives no easy response, but always replies with another question. What takes priority in my life? Does God get a look-in? In what way? Dom Henry Wansbrough OSB
