John the Baptist dominates the Gospels of the Second and Third Sundays of Advent. Last Sunday Mark painted the picture that would inspire legions of artists, particularly in Renaissance Italy of a man who wore camel skin and lived on locusts and wild honey. His death would be no less dramatically depicted.

In John's Gospel today, all this is pared away. John the Baptist appears after the cosmic first five verses of John's Gospel, depicting God as the Word, the source of life. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has never put it out. John 1.v5



The John of this Gospel is much more important as a witness than as a baptist. He is characterized by what he is *not*. He was *not* the light. He was *not* the Christ, *nor* Elijah *nor* the Prophet, in answer to the questions of the priests and the Levites. Jesus, in contrast is the understated I am:" I am the resurrection and the Life." John 11:25. John the Baptist can only identify himself in relation to Jesus. He has a crowd of ardent followers who will remain long after his cruel death but he is quick to place himself in Isaiah's prophecy "a voice that cries in the wilderness: Make a straight way for the Lord."

He is not the main act: He contrasts himself to Jesus in a figure of speech of total submission that would have shocked his Jewish audience. When he tells them that he is not worthy to loosen the sandal strap of the Messiah, he is underlining that not only is he *not* the Messiah, he is not even worthy to be his servant. Later in John's Gospel he will state empathically: "He must become greater, I must become less." John 3.30

John the Baptist reminds us that it is the Word, the Light that is important. It is the Messiah. "A man came, sent by God" has resonance for all of us in the light of our own Baptism, in the Holy Spirit. How do we live out our own witness to the Light? How do we use the Advent of 2023 to combat darkness and ensure that the Light is celebrated? What are we sent by God to do? The Advent Gospels remind us that we must wait attentively.

First Reading: Good News: Isaiah 61:1-2,10-11

The spirit of the Lord has been given to me, for the Lord has anointed me. He has sent me to bring good news to the poor, to bind up hearts that are broken; to proclaim liberty to captives, freedom to those in prison; to proclaim a year of favour from the Lord. 'I exult for joy in the Lord, my soul rejoices in my God, for he has clothed me in the garments of salvation, he has wrapped me in the cloak of integrity, like a bridegroom wearing his wreath, like a bride adorned in her jewels. 'For as the earth makes fresh things grow, as a garden makes seeds spring up, so will the Lord make both integrity and praise spring up in the sight of the nations.'

Response to the Psalm: My soul rejoices in my God. Second reading: Joy in the Lord: 1 Thessalonians 5:16-24

Be happy at all times; pray constantly; and for all things give thanks to God, because this is what God expects you to do in Christ Jesus. Never try to suppress the Spirit or treat the gift of prophecy with contempt; think before you do anything – hold on to what is good and avoid every form of evil. May the God of peace make you perfect and holy; and may you all be kept safe and blameless, spirit, soul and body, for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. God has called you and he will not fail you.

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! The spirit of the Lord has been given to me. He has sent me to bring the good news to the poor. Alleluia!

The Gospel: A Voice Crying in the Desert: John 1:6-8,19-28

A man came, sent by God. His name was John. He came as a witness, as a witness to speak for the light, so that everyone might believe through him. He was not the light, only a witness to speak for the light. This is how John appeared as a witness. When the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' he not only declared, but he declared quite openly, 'I am not the Christ.' 'Well then,' they asked 'are you Elijah?' 'I am not' he said. 'Are you the Prophet?' He answered, 'No.' So they said to him, 'Who are you? We must take back an answer to those who sent us. What have you to say about yourself?' So John said, 'I am, as Isaiah prophesied: a voice that cries in the wilderness: Make a straight way for the Lord.' Now these men had been sent by the Pharisees, and they put this further question to him, 'Why are you baptising if you are not the Christ, and not Elijah, and not the prophet?' John replied, 'I baptise with water; but there stands among you – unknown to you – the one who is coming after me; and I am not fit to undo his sandal-strap.' This happened at Bethany, on the far side of the Jordan, where John was baptising.

A Voice Crying in the Desert

So, John the Baptist came as a witness to the light. In today's gospel reading he seems rather to refuse witness. He is guite negative, answering with a stalwart and repeated 'No!'. He witnesses only that 'There is one standing among you whom you do not know'. It is not always easy to find Jesus. All the way through the Gospel of John there are misunderstandings about Jesus; people fail to recognise him for what he is: there's the Samaritan at the well, Nicodemus in the night, Mary Magdalene beside the empty tomb, even Peter and the disciples as they fish on the Lake. We can easily become so wrapped up in our own troubles and worries that we fail to recognise the one figure who can provide the solution to them, although he is standing among us, the one who 'has the words of eternal life'. He may come to us in a way we do not like, as a corrective - blocking or diverting the way we have chosen. He may come as suffering, disappointment, failure or bereavement. All of these may be acts of God's love, to show us the way, though we cannot see it at the time. It is just like John the Baptist, saying steadily 'No!', until eventually we turn around and see Christ as our true light. How can I find Jesus in the crowded events of my busy life? He often comes in unexpected ways. Is he in the guiet voice of a friend? Is he in the anger of someone I have annoyed? Is he in the rebuke of someone who knows me better than I know myself? Is he in my failures and frustrations?
