## The Epiphany

Today is the Epiphany of the Lord, where the three wise men arrived at the stable in Bethlehem to pay homage to the newly born Baby Jesus. As they were walking towards their destination, I wonder what they were expecting? Were they expecting a baby born in a manger surrounded by animals and dirt, or were they expecting a baby born as royalty?

Their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh are gifts fit for a worldly King, ones that give the impression of luxury and status. Yet, the reality they are met with is not a baby born in a palace, but born in a lowly manger. Their gifts are offered not to a worldly King, but to the heavenly King.

In the song 'Little Drummer Boy', the boy worries that he doesn't have any gifts to bring that are fit for a King, yet when faced with this, he simply plays his drum for him. There is a beauty in giving what we can – the little drummer



boy could only give his talent as a gift, but that was more than enough for the baby Jesus.

What gifts can we bring? He wants our hearts, but also our trials and worries. He wants us to give ourselves in our entirety, because He gave Himself in His entirety. Just like the three wise men, this week, try to pay homage to Jesus, the servant King, born in a manger, by giving the only gift fit for our Heavenly King – ourselves.

First Reading: Camels, Gold and Incense Isaiah 60:1-6

Arise, shine out, Jerusalem, for your light has come, the glory of the Lord is rising on you, though night still covers the earth and darkness the peoples. Above you the Lord now rises and above you his glory appears. The nations come to your light and kings to your dawning brightness. Lift up your eyes and look round: all are assembling and coming towards you, your sons from far away and your daughters being tenderly carried. At this sight you will grow radiant, your heart throbbing and full; since the riches of the sea will flow to you, the wealth of the nations come to you; camels in throngs will cover you, and dromedaries of Midian and Ephah; everyone in Sheba will come, bringing gold and incense and singing the praise of the Lord.

Response to the Psalm: All nations shall fall prostrate before you, O Lord.

**Second reading: Gods Special Secret** 

#### **Ephesians 3:2-3,5-6**

You have probably heard how I have been entrusted by God with the grace he meant for you, and that it was by a revelation that I was given the knowledge of the mystery. This mystery that has now been revealed through the Spirit to his holy apostles and prophets was unknown to any men in past generations; it means that pagans now share the same inheritance, that they are parts of the same body, and that the same promise has been made to them, in Jesus Christ, through the gospel.

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! We saw his star as it rose and have come to do the Lord homage. Alleluia!

The Gospel: Wise Men from the East Matthew 2:1-12

After Jesus had been born at Bethlehem in Judaea during the reign of King Herod, some wise men came to Jerusalem from the east. 'Where is the infant king of the Jews?' they asked. 'We saw his star as it rose and have come to do him homage.' When King Herod heard this he was perturbed, and so was the whole of Jerusalem. He called together all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, and enquired of them where the Christ was to be born. 'At Bethlehem in Judaea,' they told him 'for this is what the prophet wrote: And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, you are by no means least among the leaders of Judah, for out of you will come a leader who will shepherd my people Israel.' Then Herod summoned the wise men to see him privately. He asked them the exact date on which the star had appeared, and sent them on to Bethlehem. 'Go and find out all about the child,' he said 'and when you have found him, let me know, so that I too may go and do him homage.' Having listened to what the king had to say, they set out. And there in front of them was the star they had seen rising; it went forward, and halted over the place where the child was. The sight of the star filled them with delight, and going into the house they saw the child with his mother Mary, and falling to their knees they did him homage. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts of gold and frankincense and myrrh. But they were warned in a dream not to go back to Herod. and returned to their own country by a different way.

#### Wise Men from the East

The Wise Men, with their clever knowledge of astronomy and their lavish gifts, represent all that is best in worldly values. They also have a bit of magic about them, for frankincense and myrrh were used in spells, and the word for 'wise men' can also mean 'magicians'. In this case, the Wise Men have real wisdom and its reward, and all the respect and fame due to a 'magus' and yet they lay it all at Jesus' feet. It might be worth asking at this beginning of the year whether we submit all our skills and comforts to Jesus as the Wise Men did. The story also rests on the sharp contrast between King Herod and the Wise Men. Herod was a Jew, so he should have recognised and honoured the Jewish Messiah. Not at all! He tried to kill the Messiah. By contrast, the Wise Men, arriving from what for us would be the equivalent of outer space, carry on their search till they find Jesus and humbly bow before him. This poses a nasty question: we Christians have all the guidance and encouragement of the Church, but how often do we find those outside the Church, not even professed Christians, behaving in a more Christian way than we do ourselves! What skill, what gift may I place before Jesus today?
