The Call of Samuel

I was listening to 'Desert Island discs' on Radio four the other week. Lauren Lavern was interviewing The Champion snooker player Ronnie O'Sullivan. When asked what book he would take with him on an island, he quickly replied, "The Holy Bible." O' Sullivan went on to explain that when he was at a very low point in his life several years ago someone placed a copy of the Bible in his hands, and as he began to read he knew in his heart that he was loved by God and called by him to live by Faith in Jesus Christ.

The story of the call of Samuel in today's first reading is a favourite piece of Scripture for many people. The threefold call of the Most High, "Samuel, Samuel, Samuel" to the young child sleeping in the temple, is a reminder of that still small voice that calls each of us personally and individually. "I have called you by your name and you are mine." (Isiah: 43: 1.) When we were Baptised and immersed in the life of the Blessed Trinity, our Parents gave us a name, which defined us as a unique and irreplaceable human being with a dignity as a child of God. Like the young Samuel called by God in the temple each of us need to hear the voice of God speaking to us in our daily lives, a call that invites us to offer our lives to him in loving trust wherever and whatever we do. The first Apostles called by Jesus in today's Gospel, are asked the question,



"What do you want?" and we too need to take the question seriously. Like those first disciples we need to know more about Jesus. Will we try and follow him? Will we seek out where he lives today and spend some time with him? Will we lead others to him, like Andrew who took his brother Simon, the humble fisherman of Galilee to meet Jesus, and he became the first Pope!

Dear Jesus, give me the grace to hear and listen to your Word. Send me your Holy Spirit to enlighten and guide me. All I can do is trust you, and ask your grace day by day, to follow your way. Mary I need you. Amen.

First Reading: The Call of Samuel 1 Samuel 3:3-10. 19

Samuel was lying in the sanctuary of the Lord where the ark of God was, when the Lord called, "Samuel! Samuel!" He answered, "Here I am." Then he ran to Eli and said, "Here I am, since you called me." Eli said, "I did not call. Go back and lie down." So he went and lay down. Once again the Lord called, "Samuel! Samuel!" Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, "Here I am, since you called me." He replied, "I did not call you, my son; go back and lie down." Samuel had as yet no knowledge of the Lord and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. Once again the Lord called, the third time. He got up and went to Eli and said, "Here I am, since you called me." Eli then understood that it was the Lord who was calling the boy, and he said to Samuel, "Go and lie down, and if someone calls say, 'Speak, Lord, your servant is listening." So Samuel went and lay down in his place. The Lord then came and stood by, calling as he had done before, "Samuel! Samuel!" Samuel answered, "Speak, Lord, your servant is listening." Samuel grew up and the Lord was with him and let no word of his fall to the ground.

Response to the Psalm: Here I am, Lord! I come to do your will.

Second reading: The Body Belongs to Christ 1 Corinthians 6:13-15. 17-20

The body is not meant for fornication; it is for the Lord, and the Lord for the body. God who raised the Lord from the dead, will by his

power raise us up too. You know, surely, that your bodies are members making up the body of Christ; anyone who is joined to the Lord is one spirit with him. Keep away from fornication. All the other sins are committed outside the body; but to fornicate is to sin against your own body. Your body, you know, is the temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in you since you received him from God. You are not your own property; you have been bought and paid for. That is why you should use your body for the glory of God.

Gospel Acclamation: Speak, Lord, your servant is listening: you have the message of eternal life. Alleluia!

The Gospel: (John 1:35-42): The First Disciples

As John stood with two of his disciples, Jesus passed, and John stared hard at him and said, "Look, there is the lamb of God." Hearing this, the two disciples followed Jesus. Jesus turned round, saw them following and said, "What do you want?" They answered, "Rabbi," - which means Teacher - "where do you live?" "Come and see," he replied; so they went and saw where he lived, and stayed with him the rest of that day. It was about the tenth hour. One of these two who became followers of Jesus after hearing what John had said was Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter. Early next morning, Andrew met his brother and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" - which means the Christ - and he took Simon to Jesus. Jesus looked hard at him and said, "You are Simon son of John; you are to be called Cephas" - meaning Rock.

The First Disciples

This year the ordinary Sunday gospel readings are taken from Mark, and this provides us with a full picture of that gospel. But Mark is the shortest of the gospels, and is not guite long enough, so just occasionally a reading from John slips in to enrich our understanding of the meaning of Jesus' words and actions. Today's story is about the call of the first disciples and takes place in the Jordan valley, where John was baptising. The first two to be called are disciples of John, so they had already joined his group who were waiting for the Messiah. They were ready when John pointed him out. It is striking that Jesus first calls them to be with him, and that they remain with him for a time. In our call to follow Christ, first comes prayer and getting to know him, before we can actively work for Christ and bring others to share his joy. Only after this repose with the Lord do the disciples sprint off in their enthusiasm and bring others to join in the benefits they have received from that tranquillity and refreshment which comes from keeping company with Jesus. What is God calling you to do?

Update from Justice and Peace Refugee Project - As we start 2024, it is a good time to reflect on the global situation in relation to asylum seekers and refugees. In the past decade, the global refugee crisis has almost doubled in scope. In mid-2023, the United Nations Refugee Agency reported that there were 110 million forcibly displaced people worldwide as a result of persecution, conflict, violence, human rights violations or events seriously disturbing public order. Of these, 62.5 million were internally displaced people and 36.4 million were refugees an estimated 43.3 million (40 per cent) were children below 18 years of age, with 1.9 million children were born as refugees. The vast majority of the items and the financial support that we provide at the Refugee Project are donated by parishes, schools and individuals and without the support of donors, the project would not be possible. We thank you all most sincerely for your generous support. With new clients registering every week, in need of food to supplement their meagre allowance and with the rise in the cost of living, the cost of providing food bags and toiletry items to clients has more than doubled in the last 2 years and we are often in short supply. The project really does need your help. Financial donations are particularly welcome, as we need to purchase food and toiletries on a regular basis. We receive donations of food, clothing and footwear on Mondays between 10.30am and 1.30pm. The Project re-opens to clients after Christmas on 3 January.
